

CHAIRMAN'S INTRODUCTION

Il am delighted to present to you the annual report and financial statements for 2024 which reflects the progress of NICSSA in providing a wide range of services to its members and to the wider community. I hope you will find it interesting, informative and inspiring.

The format and style are a significant change this year, introducing our new brand and effectively showcasing our commitment to remaining relevant to the community we serve while at the same time preserving the organisation's roots and our strong connection to our members.

Despite the challenges presented by hybrid working we continued to engage closely with our volunteers in 32 workplace affiliated clubs to provide an extensive range of local activities and services. This included three very successful family mid-summer, Halloween and Christmas events involving over 1000 members during the year.

We also provided over 70 members with a range of monthly prizes under our monthly giveaway initiative, and we further enhanced NICSSA's benefits scheme by providing over 1000 offers and discounts to members in a range of leisure and other outlets across Ireland.

On the health and wellbeing front we delivered over 350 events including health and wellbeing assessments and health exhibitions, resilience courses and physical activity sessions to over 11,000 participants from a range of clients in the NICS and the wider public sector.

Our FindOut training initiative continued to grow with the addition of new service contracts for personal and team resilience and team building in a number of organisations in the public, private and voluntary sectors.

Financially, we ended the year with a healthy balance sheet position and recorded a small deficit of £6k for the year. We paid off the remaining balance of a 15- year £1.2million loan from the Bank of Ireland for capital works and we also significantly reduced our other loan liabilities to under £30k.

Turning to our wider community activities we continued to play a key role in supporting local and wider community objectives by hosting a number of local and international events at The Pavilion, Stormont. The most notable of these were the first ever cricket Test match held at Stormont between Ireland and Zimbabwe and a range of women's cricket international events. All of these events enhanced our profile in event management and in showcasing and promoting the facilities at the Pavilion complex to local, wider community and international audiences.

We also continued to play host to local community and charitable initiatives, including multi-cultural sports events, football, rugby and Gaelic games academies, children's summer schemes and several fundraising activities which supported the work of a range of local and UK based charities.

During the year we carried out a review of our strategic and business objectives in consultation with staff and key stakeholders of NICSSA which culminated in the development of new strategic and business plans for 2025–2027. The main purpose of the strategy and plans is to continue to build on the huge progress we have made in recent years to develop our services, activities and facilities for members. We remain a progressive, forward-looking organisation and we firmly believe that our ambitious plans for the redevelopment of the Pavilion and its grounds in the coming years will significantly enhance the excellent facilities and services that we provide.

As ever, I remain very much indebted to the Association's staff at all levels, to the Council, Executive Board, and various Committee members and to the many other committed volunteers who have given freely of their time to further our work for the benefit of others. We could not flourish and succeed without them.

MEMBERSHIP OVERVIEW


There are currently 6809 NICSSA throughout Northern Ireland. The breakdown of membership is as follows:

- 6.5% of members are aged between 16-18
- 86.5% of members are between 18 and retirement age
- 7% of members are of retirement age

Our membership is spread throughout Northern Ireland with the highest concentration of members living in Co. Antrim (43%) followed by Co. Down (35%). We have a small number of members living in Co. Fermanagh (1%) and we have a small number of members living in Co. Donegal (0.4%) who travel to Northern Ireland for work.

WELL PROGRAMME

WELL is a programme incorporating support, education and information on a wide range of health and wellbeing issues which is available to all Northern Ireland Civil Service (NICS) employees.

In 2024, 11,000+ NICS employees participated in WELL events.

We delivered the following:

- 190 Physical Activity sessions
- 47 Online Awareness sessions
- 7 Nutrition seminars
- 22 Resilience sessions
- 4 One-to-one sessions
- 4 Champion Training sessions
- 48 Pavilion Clinic sessions

FINDOUT CLINIC

The FindOut Clinic delivered health and wellbeing testing that provides clients with in-depth metabolic and lifestyle assessment. In 2024 **67 clients attended the FindOut Clinic**.

In 2024, we increased our services to include food intolerance testing and hormone testing in which we had 15 people tested.

nicssa Stormont provides members and users with top quality facilities including facilities for conferencing, corporate and sporting events and social activities. The Pavilion Complex is home to the NICS Social Club, 14 Affiliated Sports Clubs, Bar and Restaurant, Clinic, PlayBall pitches and Healthclub.

There are currently **968 NICS Social Club Members** based at The Pavilion. The breakdown of membership is as follows:

- 77% of members are between 18 and retirement age
- 23% of members are of retirement age

PLAYBALL

PlayBall constists of 3G 5-a-side and 7-a-side pitches as well as international standard Hockey pitches.

NICSSA STORMONT HEALTHCLUB

The Healthclub is located at our HQ and provides gym facilities as well as fitness classes to improve the health and wellbeing of our members and users.

There are 200 GymeStormont Members. The breakdown of membership is as follows:

- 5 % of members are aged between 16-18
- 72% of members are between 18 and retirement age
- 23% of members are of retirement age

In 2024, the Healthclub:

- Delivered 500+ Fitness Classes.
- Faciliated 7027 fitness classes bookings.

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT

We successfully submitted a plan to redevelop facilities at The Pavilion Complex, Stormont Estate. The plan details the creation of a centre of excellence for sports and physical activity that will create opportunities for our clubs the local and wider community to improve their lives.

The redeveloped sport facilities will be a top-class destination for sport and physical recreation, with indoor and outdoor facilities to host 16 different sports at all levels, including rugby, football, cricket, tennis, hockey, bowls and gaelic games. These will be complemented by indoor ancillary facilities and services, including a health club, conference facilities and a multi-sports hall to host netball, archery, futsal, indoor hockey, cricket, basketball, fencing, badminton, volleyball and table tennis.

NICSSA STORMONT CLUB REVIEW

TENNIS CLUB- 37 MEMBERS

The 2024 season was a good year for NICS Lawn Tennis Club, highlighted by outstanding performances, competitive and social events and, despite the weather, plenty of good tennis.

In addition to friendly matches against other local clubs the club participated in nine League and Cup competitions. Whilst the mixed and Men's events were a bit of 'win some, lose some' the ladies' teams achieved consistent success. They won the Ladies' Evergreen League (Division 2) and the Ladies' Junior Knockout Cup while remaining unbeaten in the Ladies Autumn League (Division 2). The Northern Ireland Civil Service (NICS) Ramblers Club continues to offer its members a wide range of weekend and midweek walks to suit all levels of fitness. The club also offers a variety of holidays ranging from weekend breaks to longer holidays abroad.

The 2024 walk programme followed the established pattern of alternate Saturday high level walks, generally in the Mournes and Sunday lower level walks which ranged from the North coast to the North Down coast and the Greater Belfast area. This year we introduced some longer trail walks, to encourage members who felt the Mournes were proving too challenging. The club, consisting mostly of adults at the moment, drew a mixture of members from beginner level to advanced.

Some of our members had amazing achievements throughout the year earning representation on both the GB and Ireland Veteran Teams and NI Senior Team. Claire Murray was 2nd in the NI Open Seniors, securing her spot on the NI 5 Nations Team in November 2024 and the Ireland Veteran Team for the 4 Nations. Fiona Haldane in the 70+ Category, was part of the bronze medal winning Team at the European Veterans Team Championships in Belgium, and 18th in her category at the World Veteran Championships in Dubai in October. We our very proud of our members' achievements and hope they show that fencing is a sport for any age.

Of course, all of this could not have been achieved without the coaching of Jonathan Courtney. Our club is also one of the only in NI to have access to as highly a qualified armourer as Jonathan. FOOTBALL CLUB- 101 MEMBERS

Iln 2023/24 season our men's First and Second teams both narrowly avoided relegation in their respective leagues. The first team is in NAFL Division 2B our Second Team are in Division 3F.

At the start of the new season in 2024/2025 the first and second team Managers informed the club that they were leaving to go to another football club. The committee had a meeting and appointed Chris McMaster as the new first team Manager and Fergus Black as the new Second team Manager and Robert Irwin as the Technical Director of Football. Both Managers have attracted new players to the club and the performance levels of both teams have significantly improved.

We now have a Civil Service Ladies Football Club and Girls Academy. We now have two Senior Ladies Team in the Northern Ireland Women's Football Association. The Girls Academy has two teams U13 and U14 playing in the South Belfast Youth Football Invitational League and we now have two ladies teams playing in the Northern Ireland Women's Football Association.

ATHLETICS CLUB- 39 MEMBERS

The club's flagship event, Stormont Cross Country, took place on Saturday 10th February 2024 in the grounds of Stormont Estate. In total 593 athletes finished the course across both junior and senior races.. The club also ran another very successful club championship with the individual winners and overall winners being presented with their awards at the annual Christmas lunch, held in the Pavilion in December 2024. Our annual "naked" race took place in September with 8 of our members completing the run. Many of the club members ran marathons and other races abroad during 2024, including London and Amsterdam marathons, ½ marathons and 10K in Rome. Throughout the year our members continued to support numerous running events in organisational and volunteering roles, these range from parkrun and junior parkrun to Jimmy's 10K, Portaferry 10 mile, Run in the Dark, the Belfast Half Marathon and Belfast Marathon.

For the first time in many years the club entered a male and mixed team in the NI Road Relay races in September 2024.

Tracey Atkinson represented the GB&NI Masters team in the 10K road race in Stockholm during 2024.





CHESS-8 MEMBERS

We have 2 teams in the Chess Leagues. The league season starts in October and runs through to May. So for last year the first team played in a tough 1st Division against 5 other top class teams. We ended 4th but within shouting distance of the 3rd team who we did beat twice. But chess is always complex and a result doesnt always reflect how close a match has been. Our Board 1 Mandar Tahmankar is one of the top players in Ulster and won the Williamson Shield which was held at the Pavilion on the weekend of 17th-19th January 2025 its the 3rd time Mandar has won the event. At the Ulster Chess Union AGM Mandar won the years top prize The Tom Clarke Memorial Trophy which is a grandprix over the years competitions. Our team has been a member down with the brilliant news of Karina Campbell having a baby. Karina is one of the top women in Ulster having represented Ireland in International tournaments and gained the title of WCM. The second team came 7th out of 9 but again within shouting distance of teams placed 6th and 5th. The Pavilion played host to several big chess tournaments including: The UK Open Blitz Championships Belfast Qualifier in September where the winners go on to play in the British Blitz Championships, The Ulster Masters Nov 15th - 17th and already mentioned the Williamson Shield.

Our Summer tournament was run by Captain Mark Newman when the league closes and this tournament has been run for some years. It provides an opportunity for other clubs players to play in the off-season and for our players to play competitive games. The Champion this year was from Bangor Chess Club Caleb McClean.

If you wish to drop in for a game this years Summer tournament runs on Weds nights as a drop-in Tournament between May and end of Sept.

CRICKET-137 MEMBERS

The 2024 season saw another successful season for CSNICC. The club again fielded five senior men's teams, two senior women's teams and six junior boys' and girls' teams from Under 11 to Under 17 to offer competitive and recreational opportunities to play cricket to those of all ages, genders and ability levels. The club continues to be a leading club in the Northern Cricket Union producing high quality male and female representative players from Under 13 Interprovincial level up to our Senior Interprovincial and International teams in addition to producing representative and international coaches and administrators.

On the field of play our 1st XI Men's team again competed in the NCU Premier League, Senior Challenge Cup, NCU T20 Cup and the Irish Cup. Our 2nd XI had an improved season finishing 3rd in Junior 1 and reaching the final of the T20 Plate competition. Our 3rd XI had a fantastic season winning the NCU Intermediate Cup for the first time since 2011 and finished 4th in Junior 2, the highest ranked 3rd XI in the NCU. Our 4th XI competed in Junior 3 for the first time ever, endured a challenging season but unfortunately faced relegation. It was a fantastic opportunity and achievement to play in Junior 3 as well as being the highest rank 4th XI in the NCU. Our 5th XI also had a challenging season but provided plenty of opportunity for our younger members to play along with older members and gain some valuable experience.

Our Women's 1st XI had an excellent season competing in the NCU Premier League and Senior Challenge Cup. Our 2nd XI had a fantastic double winning season, winning both Senior League 1 and NCU Challenge Plate competitions.

Two further highlights from the 2024 season were: the club having four players selected in the Ireland Under 19 World Cup squad which took place in South Africa; and Stormont hosting the Ireland versus Zimbabwe test match, a famous Irish victory and only the 2nd ever test match in Ireland and the first in Northern Ireland.

TREASURERS REPORT 2024

This report should be read in conjunction with the summarised profit and loss and balance sheet accounts on page 38 of this report. In summary, income for the year was down by £37K and expenditure fell by £23k.

Turning to the detail there were reductions in subscription income of £14k reflecting a small drop in membership, Playball Income was down by £22k due to the impact on Playball bookings because of the Euros in July 2024. Capital grants were also down by £51k reflecting the reduction in grants for capital development works which were received in 2023. These reductions in income were partially offset by increases in the WELL income up by £20k and Facilities income up by £31k to leave a net decrease in income of £37k for the year.

Overall expenditure was down by £23k due to a reduction in the depreciation charge of £27k for the year. The cost of running the Pavilion Complex also dropped in the year by £6k showing the impact of reduced energy costs. These reductions were partially offset by a small increase in salaries of £9k to leave a net decrease in expenditure for the year of £23k.

The net position of the movements in income and expenditure during the year resulted in a £6k deficit and therefore decreased total reserves by £6k from £1,930 to £1,924.

Turning to the balance sheet, fixed assets reduced by £34k showing the impact of depreciation of assets in the year. Current assets decreased by £68k because of the payment of creditors at year end including the final payment of a £1.2m loan. This effectively reduced cash in the bank at year end.

Current liabilities i.e. amount due to be paid within one year decreased by £86k, which reflected the full repayment of the BOI Loan of £1.2m.

Creditors due after one year is down to £13K which reflects the significant reduction in long term liabilities.

The net result of the variations in income and expenditure throughout the year is a small deficit of £6k and total reserves of £1,924k.
